4	Update from Youth Justice Improvement Board (GR)		Update given on work of other Implementation Groups, CHIP, and MACR Advisory Group. It was agreed this Group should seek to promote profile of and challenges faced by young people involved in offending and utilise the YJIB as a mechanism to influence CPPs. This might include highlighting Corporate Parenting responsibilities			
		to provide continuing care and on-going support for young adults leaving custody who have been Looked After. There is a window of opportunity to influence children's service plans and group should explore how they can make the greatest contribution to this. This may be via developing stats paper based on further actions/narratives created by the group.  GR provided update on Sue Brookes presentation to YJIB. 3 key areas highlighted as focus under reintegration and transitions theme:  • Financial stability/benefits;  • Housing-AM highlighted dangers of group living situations and resulting position of YOI becoming				

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	a "place of safety" which should not be the case;
•	Engagement with health-JR highlighted 3 strikes
	and you're out approach to service provision,
	including if appointments 'missed' due to entering
	custody, and subsequent difficulty accessing GP
	services; difficulties maintaining contact with yp
	due to phone issues. KF confirmed aftercare is
	gaining increased health focus; review of school
	nursing is ongoing. Good practice examples exist.

## Agreed need to recognise:

- Relationship between processes and practice and the impact on ILC for young people;
- What can be learnt from TSOs;
- Potential differences in practices for over and under 18s via WSA-GR will gain case studies for under 18s;
- Roles and responsibilities under GIRFEC and corporate parenting which may address some of these issues;
- Focus has in the past been more on entering than leaving custody, which SPS has recognised, and this should now be given increased focus.

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AK and Maggie Fallon will present at 2016 Youth Justice Conference.

Key contributions from this group:

- Use and impact of restorative approaches in preventing exclusion and as part of return to school:
- Supporting understanding and culture shift on the needs of yp at risk of or involved in offending behaviour; seeing beyond presenting behaviours; and impact of exclusion (including drawing on evaluation and training from Polmont on trauma, bereavement and loss; secure care);
- Role of partners, including school nurses, in supporting inclusion in education and return to school following exclusion;
- Sharing young people's voices and experiences;
- Alternative forms of learning needed outwith school education as part of intensive supports;
- Importance of excluded yp within children's services plans and for CPPs to be sighted on this matter;
- Strong link needed between guidance on reducing exclusion and improving attendance
- School staff who deal with these difficult situations need appropriate professional support as well as skills and knowledge;
- Having young people involved in offending recognised as a priority equality group.

2 key ways of doing so were identified and will be part of the ILC Group's action plan:

- Development and completion of proformas to develop narratives; examples of good practice; and key learning points, which can be collated;
- Explore with ADES, Education Scotland, and Developing Capacity Implementation Group how this and knowledge/experiences of members can contribute to teacher training and support, including enabling teachers to learn from good practice in SEBN schools.

#### **Relationships-Families**

Group agreed there is already some awareness of what works and that a range of approaches and tangible support were needed:

- Crisis support;
- Building on family members' skills and ability to find their own solutions to difficulties;

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- Evidence-based programmes delivered through universal and targeted interventions;
- Recognising the complexity of many cases. multimodal interventions in a number of areas of the young person/families' lives coordinated via the child's plan;
- Responsivity;
- Relationships;
- Service design that enables a range of services to be available and is flexible enough to respond to changing needs.

AMo will contribute to consideration of 'relevant services' under Part 12 of Children and Young People (Scotland) Act at a forthcoming meeting based on the above discussion. Gaining and sharing directly voices of families could also be useful.

### **Opportunities for All**

Agreed subgroup is needed due to the size of this agenda and amount of ongoing work. MG will be part of this and in addition to those already suggested. membership could include Recruit with Conviction; Includem Transitions Team; and Who Cares? Scotland. This should help to identify work that is ongoing and key issues identified from group are:

- Addressing the current invisibility of young people involved in offending from key policy initiatives:
- Barriers to accessing and sustaining learning and work beyond the school environment and postleaving school;
- Impact of disclosure.

Practice issues also identified (e.g. financial issues: support to sustain employment etc.) which this group can contribute further evidence to subgroup on as required.

#### Health

Confirmed that the group's initial strategy should be to identify what young people think about their health and wellbeing. Includem paper shared and to be supplemented with findings from North Lanarkshire Council; Barnardos; and Up-to-Us on young people's perceptions of their health needs, which will be used to develop a document to inform partners.

KF to discuss with Child Health Commissioners what is happening locally.

Exploring drug and alcohol partnership links and services to young people would also be useful: views that these services were focussing upon adults.
