

Workplan 2019-2020

Background

Our vision is a Scotland where all individuals and communities are safe and flourish; and where Scottish youth justice practice, policy and research is internationally renowned and respected.

To achieve this vision we work to advance four short-term **outcomes**:

- 1. There is a good understanding of what supports, and what are barriers to, children and young people being safe and flourishing
- 2. Youth justice practice and policy are informed by our best knowledge and evidence
- 3. Youth justice stakeholders work together to design, develop and implement improvements
- 4. Youth justice practitioners have the skills, confidence and support they need to best help children and young people

To make progress on these four outcomes our work focuses on three broad areas:

Practice Development: Working with practitioners and policy-makers to undertake, support and coordinate activities to improve outcomes

Research: Undertaking, supporting and coordinating research

Knowledge exchange: Sharing and disseminating knowledge

CYCJ is primarily funded through a grant from the Scottish Government and this workplan details the work we will deliver funded by this grant. We will also sometimes charge for some of the training listed here, to encourage attendance and cover costs.

Key deliverables this year include:

- Embed Children's Rights under the UNCRC in Scotland by: improving justice processes; supporting the use of community based interventions; supporting children to remain in families/communities; conducting research into trauma/adversity and alternatives to restraint.
- Design and deliver events for parents and carers: considering resources, tools and events to support and inform parents and carers, recognising them as key supports to children and young people
- Promote the participation of children and young people: ensuring that young people's' views are sought, listened to and taken into consideration when decisions about their lives are made
- Support the delivery and implemention of the National Standards for Secure Care and Youth Justice
- Support implementation of all aspects of the Whole System Approach and GIRFEC promoting multi-agency working across the spectrum of
 offending behaviour including EEI, diversion as prosecutorial action, court support, alternative provision to support risk reduction and
 management in the community, reintegration and transitions and high risk. Within the aspects of WSA ensure preparedness for increase in ACR,
 development of the role of RJ across WSA and focus on understanding role of violence and how to respond and the positioning of 16 and 17
 year olds
- Examine best practice with specific focus on supporting boys; families; risk practice; prevention/early intervention; bail, remand and reintegration
- Support practice by increasing knowledge of practitioners, improving practice and offering opportunities to network through: a national two day, and two one day conferences; supporting NYJAG; up-dating the youth justice guide, information sheets; roadshows, training and lectures, and practice advice for all 32 local authorities and partners.

Workplan 2019/20

The table below specifies the projects and activities we will undertake in 2019/20 funded by the Scottish Government 'CYCJ grant'. We provide a separate workplan for the IVY service and agree deliverables for the secure care work. We report on activities, progress and performance on a quarterly basis to the Scottish Government and CYCJ's Executive Governance Group. Most of our activities make some contribution to all four of our outcomes specified above, but here the key outcomes for each activity are noted. Each year we leave some capacity to respond to emerging priorities from the three youth justice implementation groups.

Project plans will be produced for each significant piece of work and kept up to date as the work progresses. These plans will specify approach, remit, timescales and outcomes in greater depth, and will be available on request.
