3.	Foxgrove FAIS Update	<p>Victoria McNulty introduced herself to the group and explained that she had joined the meeting as the last note did not reflect fully on what Foxgrove intentions were. Victoria suggested that it might be beneficial for her to attend again with a formal presentation to give a fuller input and possibly join the membership of the group going forward. A more detailed input on Foxgrove was welcomed and we will come back to Victoria regarding joining the group membership.</p> <p>Foxgrove has been in development for about 8 years and stems from Scot Gov recognition for forensic inpatient services for a small number of children regarding risk of harm from aspects of their behaviour as there is none currently in Scotland that are child specific. It will be for children and young people aged between 12-18 years, providing a 12-bedded unit (estimated 5-10 individuals at any one time) for both males and females detained under the Mental Health Act or subject to the Criminal Procedures Act.</p> <p>Foxgrove was one of the first hospitals to go through NHS Assure Process involving robust quality assurance programme. They have faced some significant delays due to COVID and the NHS Assure Process, however this time has given them opportunities to meet with others to gain valuable insight and estimate opening by Spring 2023. Foxgrove will be the first to develop a forensic nursing workforce; developed in collaboration gathering the views of young people, an art strategist, and worked with Leaders unlocked who assisted with design and recruitment. They have recruited a senior charge nurse, three charge nurses; Multi-Disciplinary Team consists of occupational health, Physio, Speech and Language Therapists, dietetics and specialisms accessed when needed. They are now taking referrals.</p> <p>Social work involvement will be through North Ayrshire Council and each young person that goes to Foxgrove will have his or her own Mental Health Officer (MHO). There is also an advocacy contract provided by Barnardo's.</p> <p>In relation to cross border placements this is currently being discussed with Scot Govt. Chris offered to link Victoria with various connections.</p>

IVY Project	<p>Dan Johnson joined to provide an overview of IVY.</p> <p>Dan provided an overview of IVY and highlighted that IVY was initially created fill the gap between CAMHS and Social Work, where one service might not meet the requirements of the young person and they may fall through the gap. IVY was initially located with CYCJ from 2013 until 2019.</p> <p>IVY is a relatively small team consisting of clinical psychologist, forensic psychologists, and a social worker. It works across three Tiers: Professional consultations, direct psychological further assessment and direct Intervention.</p> <p>They provide approx..80 consultations and deliver direct services to 25 young people per year, which include assessments and interventions. IVY also undertakes research and have recently published a paper about how Social Workers view consultation. They also do training in formulation.</p> <p>There is currently 4–6-week turnaround from referral to initial consultation, age range has spanned child as young as 5 years up to 19th birthday. It was acknowledged IVY used to have a more specific age group of 12-18 for referral however the example of 5-year-old child was in relation to aiding the supports around</p>	

		<p>the child understand the child in their experiences in order to respond appropriately in a trauma, developmentally informed manner and not through lens of risk of harm.</p> <p>Discussion recognised IVY as a very valuable service with one group member stating it is widely used across their teams. Also, important to recognise the important link between IVY support development of risk practice and observing and supporting implementation of FRAME and CARM.</p>

5.	Care Inspectorate Update	<p>Barnahaus standards Brief overview on the “Bairns hoose” (Barnahaus) standards that the Care inspectorate and Health Improvement were commissioned to draft by the Scottish Government. The four rooms approach should ensure that the children and young people have access to everything they need in one building rather than having to go to different places for each service these are Social Work, Health, Police and Justice.</p> <p>Group members were encouraged to respond to the consultation on the 11 standards which is open until 4th November.</p> <p>Secure Care and Pathway Standards Care Inspectorate working on a review of the impact/ implementation of the secure care pathway and standards and is now in phase two.</p> <p>Phase one included conversations with chief social work officers and senior managers who have knowledge and responsibility in secure care, decision making and the process, they have been in touch with all 32 local authorities to gather a great deal of information and has been very well received. They have now identified a group of 30 young people that they will be able to follow.</p> <p>Phase two has started and includes interviews with networks of professionals and families. The group of 30 young people have been broken down into three stages pre, during and post.</p> <p>12 in pre group 12 during 6 in post</p> <p>These groups will be tracked and followed in October, January and June.</p> <p>Very positive and supportive response from CSWOs who have been incredibly helpful as were the lead professionals which has enabled them to take the steps and connect with the young people, and their families who are keen to participate in this work. It is anticipated a report will be produced next year with the aim of sharing promising practice and learning. Met secure care providers and gave them the opportunity to be involved.</p> <p>Change in Methodology Care Inspectorate has reviewed their focus with regard to child protection to have a wider lens on risk of harm which ensures older children are included and recognises the needs of all children for protection rather than narrow lens of child protection which tended to have more application with younger children. Methodology now looking at vulnerable young people who are in care and risk processes, 5 published inspections – reflections at the early stages highlights this is an area of development and learning.
